#### Surrey County Council Vacancy—Walking Instructor

The Safer Travel Team at Surrey County Council have 3 vacancies for a Walking Instructor based in Woking or Guildford. This is a bank, term-time position, with no set or guaranteed hours. The 'Feet First: Walking Training' service was launched nearly three years ago. The training is targeted at pupils in Year 3, and is a service that is available to all primary schools across the county. The aim of 'Feet First' is to provide trainees with vital road safety skills to better enable them to safely walk to and from school with an adult and prepare them for future independent travel. It is taught through a combination of classroom and practical roadside sessions. The practical sessions are delivered by trained Walking Instructors, employed by Surrey County Council. # Reception






Reception have thoroughly enjoyed learning all about food over the last few weeks. We learnt about healthy and unhealthy foods and what a balanced diet might look like. We tasted different fruits and did fruit printing after reading Handa's Surprise.

We learnt about respecting each other and how we are all unique as we read Carla's Sandwich. We designed unique sandwiches. The children taught a robot how to make a sandwich by writing clear instructions.

In maths, we have been learning number bonds to 10! We have represented 10 in different ways, such as using Numicon, our fingers, whole part models and number sentences.

# Year 4

The Year 4 children visited Butser Farm on Tuesday 25<sup>th</sup> March. Butser Ancient Farm is an archaeological open-air museum and experimental archaeology site located near Petersfield in Hampshire, featuring reconstructions of prehistoric, Romano-British and Anglo-Saxon buildings.









The children had a terrific time learning about what life was like during the Anglo-Saxon era, which is what they are learning about this half term in History. The trip was a practical experience, which included digging

# **Barnsbury Athletics News**

At Barnsbury Primary we believe that athletic competitions are important for children, as they foster physical and mental development, teaching valuable life skills like teamwork, resilience, and sportsmanship, while also promoting healthy habits and a positive attitude towards challenges and setbacks.

Our school Athletics Teams have been very busy this half term. Showing their dedication to all of their training sessions, and in addition, training on weekends with local runs and clubs.

# **Whale Wise**

Earlier in the year, KS2 enjoyed an assembly from Whale Wise. They have been working with the Eco Council to share updates directly from Iceland and to answer some of our questions. Please see a section of their newsletter below:

#### Winter whales of the Westfjords

Normally our field season takes place in summer and autumn, which seems to be the period of peak humpback whale occurrence in the Icelandic Westfjords. However, 2025 has been the year of change for Whale Wise, as we increasingly monitor cetaceans in winter months. After a three-week field season in northeast Iceland to document cetaceans at the site of a future port (see our <u>blog post</u>), Alyssa and I headed back to our main base in the Westfjords in early February. Since then, in between computer work and winter storms, we have taken every opportunity to look for whales in the region. We aim to document their occurrence (which is critical in areas lacking baseline data) and to collect aerial images, providing valuable health data for humpback whales (length and body condition). Our observations so far have been very exciting.

We've seen humpback whales throughout virtually the entire period, which we weren't necessarily expecting in midwinter when most whales have migrated southwards. In particular, one whale - which we named Rooster - has spent most of their time in the very inner part of Steingrímsfjörður. We have become very attached to this young whale and their varied behaviours. Always moving at speed, we've seen Rooster feeding at the surface (likely on capelin, a small schooling fish), pushing through thin layers of sea ice and even seeming to eat mud, probably filtering the sediment for small prey items. Beyond humpbacks, we've seen white-beaked dolphins, harbour porpoises and even massive fin whales coming into the area, which was an incredible sight. However, probably our most special encounters have been with a group of orcas led by the matriarch Sakkara. After two incredible visits in 2024, Sakkara and her pod came back this March, displaying some incredible hunting behaviours. # What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

# INSTAGRAM

QGE RESTRICTION

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

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Instagram remains one of the world's most popular social media platforms, especially among teens — with around 70% of 13 to 17-year-olds using it. Owned by Meta, Instagram allows users to share photos and videos, create interactive 'stories', broadcast live, send private messages and follow others. With regular updates and new features, it's essential for parents and educators to stay informed about how children are using the app — and what the risks are.

#### THREADS INTEGRATION

Threads is Instagram's sister app for public, text-based conversations. Posts from Threads appear in users' Instagram feeds and can lead children to view, share, and comment on public conversations with strangers. The content may not always be age-appropriate and can be misleading or false.

#### SCHEDULED MESSAGING

Instagram's newer ability to schedule direct messages means that children could receive messages late at night or early in the morning. This can disrupt their sleep or keep them preoccupied before the school day even begins.

# EXCLUSION AND LOW

Feeling left out online can have a real emotional impact. Being left out of photos, receiving fewer likes, being unfollowed, or being ignored in chats and comments can leave children feeling excluded, which often hurts as much as in real life. There is a risk this can lead to reduced self-esteem and a sense of not belonging.

## EXCESSIVE SCREEN

Instagram's design encourages prolonged use through endless scrolling of trending content and generating a fear of missing out (FOMO). Children can quickly lose track of time browsing posts from friends, influencers, and strangers, which may disrupt their day-to-day activities.

#### AI CHATBOT CONCERNS

Meta's AI, which is available on Instagram, allows users to chat with an in-app chatbot. While often helpful, it can blur boundaries for young users, who may ask for or read content that is inappropriate or see it as a real friend or confidant. Privacy issues also arise, as conversations may not be as secure or private as children assume.

#### RISKS OF GOING LIVE

The livestream feature allows real-time broadcasting to followers – or anyone, if the account is public. This increases the chance of unwanted contact from strangers and pressure to act in ways that gain attention, including engaging in inappropriate behaviour. Viewers may also post offensive or harmful comments during live sessions.

# Advice for Parents & Educators

#### **USE INSTAGRAM'S SUPERVISION TOOLS**

Instagram's built-in Family Centre lets parents monitor how much time their child spends on the app. Specialised 'teen accounts' are private by default and offer controls on who can message them. Make sure that children use their real age when registering their account to ensure they have these protections.

#### OPEN UP THE CONVERSATION

Talk regularly to the children in your care about what they enjoy on Instagram – and what makes them uncomfortable. Encourage honest chats about filters, body image, and online approval. Reassure them that they don't need to edit their appearance or chase 'likes' to feel valued.

### BE MEDIA-SAVVY WITH INFLUENCERS

SET BOUNDARIES FOR THREADS AND AI

Parents should follow a few of the influencers their child watches, so they can better understand the content they re seeing. Use this as a springboard to talk about the difference between genuine recommendations and paid promotions and how online personalities can shape opinions and behaviour.

Parental controls on instagram also apply to Threads. These allow parents to monitor time spent in the app, check follower lists and adjust exposure to sensitive content. Discuss Al features, too, therefore helping children understand that chatbots aren't real people and should be used with care.


